PEACE AND DEVELOPMENT FOR ALL PROJECT INVENTORY


For the Consultative Group that took place in February 2002 in Washington, D. C., the Guatemalan Government presented a project inventory to the consideration of the international community with the title "Peace and Development for All", with the object of sustaining the financing negotiations that would allow it to complement the national efforts to strengthen compliance with the peace agreements and the public policies oriented towards poverty reduction. This inventory was classified in two great groups: Projects being negotiated, which included those projects for which formal negotiations had begun with an identified source; and Projects without an Identified Source.


PROJECTS BEING NEGOTIATED:


As of September 30, 2001, last date included in the information presented to the Consultative Group in February 2002, the project inventory registered 77 projects being negotiated before the different cooperating sources, for an amount of US\$1,051,259 thousand, of which US\$132,975 thousand would be contributed by the government; US\$8,705 thousand would be constituted by other contributions that basically would come from the support of the local community and governments; and US\$909,580 thousand were expected to be obtained from international cooperation sources.

Because of the dynamics of a project portfolio, as of March 31, 2003 the situation underwent some changes. Noticeable is a decrease both in the number of projects being negotiated as in the amounts, except in the contributions from others that presented an increase. The registry at that date is of 54 projects being negotiated for a total amount of US\$885,337 thousand, of which US\$130,688 thousand correspond to government contributions, US\$11,366 thousand to other contributions and US\$743,283 thousand to external resources.



Of the initial portfolio 15 projects with an amount of US\$35,918 thousand in external resources were transferred to the portfolio of those projects without an identified source in order to seek another financing sources, because those identified initially did not show any interest in them; 8 projects for an amount of US\$25,912 thousand in external resources were taken out of the inventory after the cleansing done by the public sector institutions.

During the period of February 2002 to March 2003, 72 agreements were subscribed and the respective projects passed to the execution state for an amount of US\$656,900 thousand in external resources, of which 79 percent is reimbursable financial cooperation that was contracted with the Inter-American Development Bank (IADB), Central American Economic Integration Bank (CAEIB), International Bank for Reconstruction and Development, (IBRD) and the Republic of China. Four percent corresponds to reimbursable technical cooperation mainly with the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development; 2 percent is formed by non-reimbursable technical cooperation, mainly from Canada, IADB, United Nations Organization for Agriculture and Food (FAO), United Nations Development Program (UNDP), Japan, UNDP/Sweden, UNDP/International Work Organization (IWO), UNDP/Holland, UNDP/Norway, and UNDP/Netherlands. Fourteen percent comes from non-reimbursable financial cooperation from the United Nations Population Fund (UNPF), Japan, United States, Central American Economic Integration Bank, Canada, the European Union, Germany and Sweden; and the remaining 1 percent is integrated by food donations from the World Food Program.

Among others, these resources will support the following sectors: Financial, Health and Social Services; Education, Science and Culture; Agriculture and Livestock; Housing and Urban and Rural Development; Transportation; Industry and Commerce; Water and Sanitation; Work and Social Security; Administration and General Services.

On the other hand, 29 new projects went into the projects being negotiated inventory, of which 14 require reimbursable external resources for an amount of US\$297,841 thousand and 15 projects require non-reimbursable external resources for US\$100,599 thousand. This demand arose mainly from the sectors: Multi-sector; Education, Science and Culture; Administration and General Services; Transportation; Water and Sanitation; Environment; Agricultural; Financial; Work and Social Security; Health and Social Services; Industry and Commerce; Housing and Urban and Rural Development.

The situation of demand by sector can be observed in Table 2.


PROJECTS WITHOUT AN IDENTIFIED SOURCE:

As of September 30, 2001 the registered projects without an identified source to support their financing were 134, for a total amount of US\$2,094,271 thousand, of which US\$678,784 thousand would be the government's contribution, US\$166,312 thousand would come from other contributions and the amount to be financed would be US\$1,249,175 thousand.

As of March 31, 2003, the number of projects was 150; the total amount had increased to US\$2,095,410 thousand. Contributions were required from the Government for US\$667,607 thousand, from other sources US\$154,493 and external resources for US\$1,273,310 thousand.


The changes in the portfolio of projects without an identified sources are a consequence of the updating and classification by priority of the projects done by the executive units, due to the request presented by the international community immediately after the meeting of the Consultative Group ended in February 2002, which provoked new projects to be included and others excluded. Two projects changed their situation, one to in-execution when financing was obtained from the IADB and the other to in-negotiation before the same source, and three projects were excluded from the 'without identified source portfolio',

at the request of the executive units. As a consequence, its total amount decreased by US\$32,447 thousand, the government resources by US\$15,645 thousand, contributions from others by US\$11,887 thousand and required external resources by US\$32,447 thousand. The new projects that entered the inventory were 21, which require a total amount of US\$81,523 thousand, of which US\$13,265 thousand would be Government contributions, US\$78,538 thousand would be external resources and US\$68 thousand contributions from others.

The behavior by sector had a slight variation that may be observed in table 4.
